


Welsh Government Update

I recently attended an event aimed at keeping head teachers informed as to the progress of the Welsh Governments reforms, and you may well have picked up some of this though the Welsh news. A new curriculum, aimed at freeing up schools from overly subject specific teaching and rather focussing on some key skills and core purposes, has been delayed and will now not be statutory until a gradual roll out in 2022. This certainly gives us plenty of time to prepare, but I am little concerned that a lot can happen in politics in 5 years and that 2022 could easily metaphorically be the 'long grass'! Let's hope not as reform is long overdue. What also appears to still be something of a blank piece of paper are the assessment and accountability models (testing children and grading schools) - these are key drivers to the ways schools organise themselves and the keynote speaker that delivered our training (Professor Mick Waters) certainly was radical in his thoughts, suggesting that, for example, categorisation wasn't beneficial to school improvement and that all Estyn Inspectors should do at least a half-term's teaching every year in order to maintain their credibility!! In the spirit of Prof Waters' suggestion, I am teaching Year 6 tomorrow!
